MSNBC.com Executive Editor Richard Wolffe: "It's outrageous that there is this witch hunt going on on the right about these people of color, let's face it, around this President: Eric Holder, Valerie Jarrett, now Susan Rice; before it was Van Jones. This is not about who is hawkish in the same way John McCain is about foreign policy, because if you look at Iran and Libya, Susan Rice checks those boxes. This is a personal vendetta. Pushing Republicans to Accept Obama's Tax Hikes

"You talked about tax reform; the President is talking about specific increases. He campaigned on specific increases in tax rates from 35% to 39% for those making more than \$250,000. So, is that on the table, right now?...But is it on the table to talk about, because he campaigned on it, 60 percent of the voters have said that they are ready to raise these taxes. They are ready to have the wealthier Americans pitch in."
